Nature Notes



As natural food supplies become scarce, most wild creatures will either be hibernating or spending their time searching for food. Certainly the local bird population have relied heavily on those generous folks who put out peanuts, seeds, fat balls and so on. During the snowy spell in early December, with berries already stripped from the hedgerows, many wild birds had to rely on

feeding stations. Our usual 2-3 blackbirds, suddenly became 10-12 blackbirds, all chasing each other and fighting for the best bits. Having seen no starlings at all so far this winter, suddenly a flock of 20 or more appeared. We often have coal tits visiting briefly to take a piece of peanut and fly off with it to eat. This year at least 3 pairs of them have been seen and they are staying to eat, fighting for a place with all the blue tits, great tits and long tailed tits. 8-10 rather large pigeons have been tidying up any large pieces of seed which the other birds have been unable to swallow. Several dunnocks, a dozen house sparrows, several robins, a greater spotted woodpecker and partner, a thrush and a couple of wrens have also been regular visitors. News must have spread that corn was on offer, as one day a large cock pheasant braved the close proximity of people to get his share. A nuthatch and a pied wagtail have both looked for insects around an old dead tree. No sign so far of the sparrow hawk who used to speed through the garden looking for unwary small birds. They are all lovely to see - but it is costing us a fortune!

Weather Watch

Dilwyn Weather for November 2017

Less than 2 inches of rain fell (45mm), continuing the run of below average amounts this year. Our running total with just one month to go, now stands at 25 inches (625mm). November saw reasonably mild weather, with daytime highs ranging from 8 to 15 degrees and averaging 11. Nights varied, with some frosts and occasional mild episodes (average just under 2 degrees). Sunshine came in short bursts and only 6 or 7 days could be considered 'mostly sunny'. The barometer only dropped below 100mb for a 2 day spell, and this brought the windiest weather in an otherwise fairly peaceful month.



Parish Council Matters

- 1. The Dilwyn Parish Council Website: A new website is in the process of being set up for the council and access may be gained from the existing Dilwyn.com Community Website or directly by accessing dilwynparishcouncil.gov.uk . Full details on access are to be found on page 2 of this magazine. It should be noted that a considerable amount of work still needs to be done to bring the new site fully up to date.
- 2. The full, approved minutes of Dilwyn Parish Council meetings, as prepared by the Parish Clerk, are published regularly on the Village Notice Boards and the council's new website, dilwynparishcouncil.gov.uk. What follows here summarises matters of particular interest and any decisions taken at a specific meeting.

The Regular Meeting of Dilwyn Parish Council held in the St. Mary's CE Primary School, Dilwyn on Tuesday, 7th November, 2017

At this meeting, 10 Councillors were present, with apologies from Cllrs. A. Brown and T. Kyles. The Parish Clerk, Mr. Gwilym Rippon, and the Ward Councillor, Mark Cooper were in attendance; there were 4 members of the public present.

a. Public Participation:

To receive the Police report.

There was no police presence; however it was reported that there had been a battery stolen. The Ward Councillor presented his report.

To receive questions from members of the public.

There were no questions from members of the public present.

b. To approve the General Parish Council meeting on Tuesday, 3rd October, 2017 RESOLVED: The minutes of the General Parish Council meeting of 3rd October 2017 were approved.

c. Information arising from the minutes.

The War Memorial: The Clerk reported that he had been in contact with the War Memorials Trust and the suggestion was made that the views of residents be sought regarding possible additions to the inscriptions. In addition, the views of Churchwarden Tom Hawksley and of the Dilwyn British Legion's Secretary David Fowler were being canvassed.

d. Correspondence received:

It was reported that the hedge opposite the Coach House was overgrown; the Clerk reported that he had contacted Stephen Challenger at Hereford Cathedral who stated that the matter was not the responsibility of the Diocese. However, on reflection that view had now been reversed and the work would be put in hand.

e. Finance:

To note the bank balances for October 2017.

The Clerk reported the following

The bank balances as circulated were noted.

To discuss and approve invoices for payment. The Clerk was instructed to pay all invoices. Full details can be seen on the village notice-boards.

Balfour Beatty. It was reported that there had been no progress regarding the potholes at Venmore Road. The ditch at Rose Cottage still needs attention; it was suggested that this might be a task for the Lengths-man.

g. Planning matters

RESOLVED: This application was discussed and the Council offers no objection to the application.

2. 173613: Application for a proposed cover to existing silage bunker at Bidney Farm, Dilwyn, Herefordshire, HR4 8JQ.

RESOLVED: This application was discussed and the Council offers no objection to the application

3. 173533: Application for a proposed alteration to access at The Pantiles, Dilwyn, Herefordshire, HR4 8EU.

RESOLVED: This application was discussed and the Council offers no objection to the application.

4. 173877: Application for Proposed extensions at Headlands Cottage, Pembridge, Leominster, Herefordshire, HR6 9EJ.

RESOLVED: This application was discussed and the Council offers no objection to the application.

RESOLVED: A site visit would be arranged.

6. 173829: Application for the proposed conversion of redundant agricultural buildings to form holiday accommodation together with associated landscaping at Pitch Farm, Dilwyn, Herefordshire, HR4 8JH.

RESOLVED: A site visit would be arranged

h. Carols on the Green: It was requested that as many Councillors turn up as possible.

i. The Village Website

This was discussed, The Clerk reported that he had been in touch with VisionICT and had set up a dummy website for members to pass comment on. Cllr. I Brown stated that there was funding from the transparency fund which was accessible via HALC.

RESOLVED: That the proposal for this website be accepted and that the Clerk should explore the possibility of funding.

j. Update on the Neighbourhood plan

A full update was given as to the current position regarding the Neighbourhood Plan. It was suggested that the 'Community Right to Build' could be involved regarding possible development at the Crown; this would be discussed at the next meeting.

It was agreed that a special informal meeting of Councillors should be arranged with the NDP group, together with the representative of Data Orchard, in order to discuss the progress made to date.



A winner of 2017 BBC Radio 2 Folk Award Lucy Farrell is at last embarking on the solo career so many have been hoping for, since first hearing her exquisite renditions of traditional ballads and quietly moving original songs.

As one fourth of The Furrow Collective, Lucy is the current recipient of the Best Group prize following the release of their widely acclaimed Wild Hog LP, earned during an immensely busy and creative time in which she contributed to the raved about return to form that was the Eliza Carthy & The Wayward Band's Big Machine album and tour, and also saw her final shows with the Emily Portman Trio with whom she'd sung, sawed and played viola for many years. An inveterate collaborator, the news that Lucy is to take centre stage in her own right comes as a welcome surprise to all those who've been entranced by her haunting and quintessentially English voice, subtle and instinctive musicianship and her ability to connect emotionally with an audience.

Lucy Farrell first enchanted fans of traditional music when she began performing as a duo with fellow Newcastle Folk Degree graduate Jonny Kearney (with whom she first played in Dilwyn). Invited to become the regular opening act for The Unthanks, Lucy & Jonny's blend of wry and lovelorn



tales with exquisite interpretations of English, Scottish and American ballads saw them frequently outselling the headline act at the CD stall.

As well as Lucy's fruitful partnership with singer and songwriter Emily Portman and the award winning harpist and singer Rachel Newton, she has also written, performed and recorded with numerous bands and projects including Dark Northumbrian, Gluepot, a star-studded live tribute to Norma Waterson, and also formed her own group Ogres. Although she's rejected the conventional career path, Lucy has become one of the most in demand musicians and vocalists on the young folk scene.

Signed to the impressively visionary Hudson Records, Lucy Farrell has returned to the traditional folk songs that have remained at the heart of everything she's done. These are the ballads that inspire her own compositions, but in their own handed-down beauty and strangeness tell fantastical stories beyond our imaginations. And in her voice they bewitch anew.

The Wigmore Ghost

In 1974 I made my first foray into real estate - Steppes House in Wigmore. It is the brick and timber house on the left as you head North to Leintwardine, opposite what now describes itself as "The Oak" gastropub, but was then the Royal Oak. Actually

the food is very good there. In those days it was run by John & Mary Artingstall and was the provider of most liquid refreshment to us.

Steppes House has a 14 C. cellar and the rest is 17 C. using timbers from the Civil War reduction of Wigmore Castle with, unusually, a brick infill. Our predecessors, who were antique dealers, had restored it beautifully, leaving us with a fine corner cupboard in which they had placed a 17/18 C. slipper found under the floorboards.

Sadly we only ever used the house at weekends, dashing up from London, often with friends. One morning at breakfast Cynthia on her first visit casually said: "I saw your little old lady last night." Hilary and I were a little surprised, but then Roger, who was a regular, told us he had often seen her, but had never mentioned it!



The baby - now 41 - came along. In laws were 15 miles nearer to London and so inevitably in 1980 the house was sold. However we have both had a great affection for the place and sometimes stop and peer over the fence. We haven't yet been arrested or attacked by a fierce dog! About 10 years ago we were caught in the act by the then owners. We explained that we had once owned it. "Oh" they said "Were you ever aware of anything?" They told us that when going into the kitchen they often felt that someone was touching them.
