### Church Clock

Time keeping on the church clock has long been slightly erratic. Cumbria Clocks' assessment is that it could be one of 2 things:

- 1) A problem with the hands.
- 2) A problem with the pendulum.

To try and establish which, the hands have been stopped at 12 o'clock and disconnected from the mechanism. The clock will continue running and striking for a period of 2-3 weeks while we assess timekeeping with the hands disconnected. So you will continue to hear it striking the correct time on the hour, but the hands will only show the right time at midday and midnight!

#### **Nature Notes**

It was great reading the Nature Notes as always, and I'm so pleased that Emma & Jo have taken on Alan's mantle.

I'm about half-way through Isabella Tree's Wilding book, which is amazing. It really echoes with me as I studied landscape ecology and habitat fragmentation and know that hedgerows and 'wild' areas are so important for wildlife - for corridors and islands of sanctuary. We replaced an old leylandii hedge with a mixed, native woodland one along one side of our property and 2 years on, it's now nearly my height and starting to thicken.

I've noticed how much wildlife lives in the hedgerows as I walk the dog along a public right of way. I was very excited to see a stoat for the first time recently, who had a field mouse in its' mouth! Just near the kissing gate by Chapel Fields (near the new houses being built) down the Common way. Along the same walk I've seen swans flying over, red kites, and badger spoor. And in the hedges: dunnocks, hedge sparrows, robins, pheasants, rabbits and now the little stoat.

All the best and keep up the good work both!

I read with interest Emma Jordan's article on hedges and thought she might be interested that whilst we haven't gone to the lengths that the Knepp Estate have, we have 're-wilded' our hedges.

We haven't cut our non-roadside hedges, about 100 miles in length, for nearly 20 years. They provide a good deal of food and habitat for all types of wildlife and whilst we haven't done a survey to compare with those cut annually, we are told we have a much greater abundance than the standard practice.

I know my father would turn in his grave at the sight of uncut hedges and many regard them as untidy but it works for us.

Assuming you persuade people to leave hedges uncut your next challenge is to persuade them not to cut their lawns! That way they will capture more carbon, retain more water and provide a better habitat for wildlife.



## Weobley Branch, Herefordshire Wildlife Trust

For our February meeting, Martyn Davies gave us a very colourful and informative talk about his visit to Bolivia to view the butterflies showing us over 100 spectacular slides. It is remarkable that Bolivia is home to over 3500 butterfly species (we have about 58 in Britain) and can be found up to 4000m high.

Martyn went in November staying in the jungle at around 1500m. He went out daily to sites, generally near water where the butterflies would come to rehydrate and take on minerals. Butterflies live longer in the tropics, sometimes up to a year, and hence, need to take on plenty of food. Some of the butterflies are similar to ours e.g. blues, hairstreaks and skippers and others are fantastic exotics.

The angle that a butterfly is viewed from is important as the light is refracted causing iridescence which can be dazzling from some angles, but dull from others. Typical is a Morphos with 8" wingspan flashing brilliant blue.

We were introduced to Batesian mimicry in which one harmless species mimics a harmful e.g. poisonous species such as hoverflies and wasps and Mullerian mimicry where harmful species all resemble each other.

A very enjoyable evening but tinged with some sadness as the habitat is fast disappearing along with the insects.

Our next meeting is on Thursday 5th March when Tony Norman and David Griffith will be talking about his work on re-establishing the Black Poplar. This is a tree species that became so uncommon that it stopped reproducing in the wild so most of the trees are over 150 years old and the species was heading for extinction in Britain. Tony's work is trying to reverse this trend.

## Dilwyn Weather for Jan 2020

Three and a half inches (85mm) of rain fell to begin the new year, which is about what we might expect. Temperatures, however, have been well above average. Only six frosts, none severe, helped keep the night time average at 3 degrees for the month (normally around zero). Day time temperatures averaged 11 degrees (more usually 8).

Sunshine was in short supply, with just seven days having mostly sunny conditions. A couple of gales in mid month included Storm Brendan. As the barometer rose after the last gale, pressure went up to 1048mb for a couple of days – the highest I have recorded – and brought settled but misty conditions.

## Village Vintage

It was thought that a bit of village history would be appreciated in our monthly publication and as I research family history in my spare time and professionally it means I come across a lot of fascinating articles from within our parish so I thought it might be interesting to include some of them here! For now I have decided to go with a bit of 'on this month in history' from local newspaper articles, I hope you enjoy them.

#### Hereford Times - Saturday 14 March 1863

"Dilwyn.—The Princes marriage was celebrated with spirit in this parish. The committee (Messrs. Cranston, A. Rogers, Bray, Bruton, and Coleman) appointed to collect funds for the entertainment of the poor, obtained the sum of £36 18s. 2d, which was expended as follows: -150 poor families were supplied with 2lbs of beef a quantity of bread, and a pint of good ale, to drink the healths of the illustrious couple. The beef supplied amounted 1,010 lbs., the bread to 300 sixpenny loaves. £1 6s. was paid to the ringers. The list subscriptions included—D. P. Esq., £5; Lady Frances Harcourt £3, Rev. C. H. Morgan, E. W. Coleman, Esq., J. Burlton, Esq., and H. Moore, Esq., £2 each; Mr. T. Cranstone, £1 10s.; Rev. J. Powell, Rev. S. Powell, Mr. Corfleld, Mr. Winnatt, Mr. Pitt, Mr. Rogers, Mr. Bray, sen., J. Lambe, Esq., Mrs. Lloyd, and Mrs Higgins, £1 each; with many smaller donations, making total of £35 183. 3d. The gentry and farmers also gave a substantial dinner to their workpeople. In the afternoon, the National school children of Dilwyn and Dorstone (upwards of 200) marched in procession through the village to the school-room, cheering and singing, with flags flying. There they were regaled with cake and tea, the day's amusements closing with rural sports, the ascent of a large fire-balloon, and the singing the national anthem."

– Although this beautifully describes how we have always put on a good show for a National event and still do, such as supporting VE75 this year, I think it also powerfully illustrates exactly how poor a rural community we were at this time.

This next article is a fun one, during the late 18th century people were in awe of the spiritual and the occult and people often went around selling cures, lotions and potions and medical aid and were later referred to as quacksalvers (or quacks from a Dutch word meaning "boaster or hawker of salve"), and snake oil peddlers etc, and it would seem that we had one of our own here in Hereford...

#### Hereford Journal - Thursday 08 March 1787

"HEREFORD, March 7 1787 - Another Cure performed by CHRISTIAN KREBS, Surgeon and Occultist, since his arrival in this City: A son of John Davis, of the parish of Church Dilwyn, near Leominster, in this county, aged 16 years, has been blind for three years, so as not to discern scarlet; can now see to pick up a pin from the ground.— This was done in the space of a fortnight. Mr Krebs is to be consulted with at his apartments at Mr Douglas's, Seedsman, High-Town. Letters, post paid, duly answered."

- A spring miracle of no mean feat! Poor Mr Davis I wonder how much he was charged for such a cure, proof that there were plenty of ingenious scammers even back then...

## **Weobley History Society**

For the Weobley & District Local History Society January meeting members gave some very interesting and varied talks and information about topics of interest. Liz Holley enthused us about the building of the castle shortly after the Norman invasion in 1066. The new lords, de Lacy, had their main residence in Weobley and built the castle to control and defend the area. Liz highlighted the fact that this would have been a major operation requiring large movements of men and materials and it would have been a boom time for Weobley. Sue Hubbard related tales about contrary views of history and how stories are embellished by granny (where does the truth lie?). Maggie Waldman informed us of the resurrection of the Leominster Study Group as a local history publishing group which encourages members to research local history. John Simons described Woodchester mansion, a remarkable large Gothic building near Stroud which was never finished but remained in a state of suspended animation until taken over by a group of enthusiastic volunteers. The owner actually built and completed a monastery and a church. Bea Dennis described a tale of derring do. A friend of hers was ordered by king George V in 1917 during the Russian revolution to find the last surviving member of the Russian royal family, the grand duchess Olga and rescue her. Eventually and after much danger in the chaos of revolution, Olga was found in Crimea and escaped hidden in a cart of watermelons and was put on a British frigate. She spent her days of freedom as a farmer in Canada. Norman Haynes brought in a copy of the 1939 census which was carried out to find out who was living in the country as war loomed. It listed every family in every house so is fascinating for those people researching their house history. Weobley village had a population of 349 and the surrounding area 480. Brian Holley related some of his family history including an ancestor who was with Custer in 1868 when he was fighting the native Americans. Sandra Collins reminisced about her valuable work when setting up the Weobley museum. Thanks for all the speakers who provided such friendly entertainment.

Our next meeting is on Wednesday 25th March in Weobley (Hopelands) Village Hall at 7.30pm which will start with a demonstration of the new App for the Ella Mary Leather folklore with members having the opportunity for hands on experience. This is followed by the AGM. We are looking for (willing) volunteers for Treasurer, Programme secretary and Publicity officer.


## VE75 Anniversary 2020





#### **Nature Notes Wonderful Willow**

Last March, we were surprised to see bumblebees completely covering a willow tree – it was truly an unusual sight. Pussy willow (Salix caprea) is an invaluable pollen and nectar source for queen bumblebees when they emerge from hibernation. As there is not much else flowering at this time, having a food plant near to where they emerge prevents them having to burn essential energy foraging.

Willow can provide a wealth of wildlife benefits (it is the food plant for the purple emperor butterfly) and is especially effective in flood-prone areas as it slows down water, provides carbon sequestration and can be used for renewable energy, soil stabilisation and weaving – the list is endless. It is a truly wonderful plant!

With the loss of damp wetland habitat and other factors, the willow tit has declined in number by 94% from 1970–2012. So, you can imagine how excited I was to see a willow tit feeding on the fat balls in our garden on the 15th January! Feasting alongside were nine long-tailed tits and two great spotted woodpeckers. All winter we have been graced by a beautiful flock of 50+ fieldfares performing flypasts over the house, along with starlings – the swoosh above is quite breathtaking.

Last year, I decided to rotavate a two-metre square patch of our garden lawn to sow some seeds of teasel and evening primrose (great for moths). In early January, to my delight, three goldfinches arrived and have been feeding on them constantly ever since. Well worth rotavating up the lawn!

Every winter, I look forward to scarlet elf cap (a bright red fungus) springing up in the garden and a visit to see the snowdrops at Sarnesfield Church. What a beautiful sight.

On the 5th February, I spotted at least 60 swans grazing on the winter crops near Credenhill. What an unusual sight to see. That night at midnight, a tawny owl flew across the road by the Garnstone Estate. A barn owl was also spotted flying up our lane in January, so I persuaded my dad to build a barn owl box (it took him two hours). I just need to get it up now before it's too late.

The majority (97%) of modern barns are unsuitable for barn owls unless a nest box is installed. This is a great time to get nest box building and erecting (don't forget about bats too!). You can download box designs from the Barn Owl Trust, RSPB or Wildlife Trusts websites (or ask my dad)!

#### The Curse of Potholes 5

**Venmore Lane C1091.** To try and get improvements to Venmore Lane I have written once again to Clive Hall at Highways Hereford Council with a copy to Bill Wiggin MP. They all tell me in a roundabout way that there are worse roads in the county than ours, and there is nothing in the 20/21 budget to carry out any surfacing.

To make use of the Balfour Beatty defect reporting system, I walked from the A4110 to the Crown and photographed 22 significant defects each with its GPS reference, then emailed these to BBlivingplaces. I have since been notified and have also observed that just 2 of these defects have been rectified. Merely to get us off their backs, the more people who complain to the council and their contractor, BB, the better. Please drop them an email to the contacts below.

The lack of funds to bring roads up to a reasonable standard is partly Government cut back, but significantly council allocation of funds. If Hereford is paying £200,000 in gagging orders\*, then the road budget must inevitably suffer. Intriguing that 98% of railway fare money goes back into the railways, but only 23% of road vehicle taxation goes back into roads. At least (at the moment) Hereford has not like Shropshire appointed a "Pothole Consultant" at £1000 a day for a six month stint.
