No driver can be unaware of the terrible state of our roads, with the number and size of potholes seemingly increasing constantly and very rapidly. Dilwyn Parish Council regularly reports these defects, but very few actually receive attention. It is, of course, understandable that the sheer scale of the problem places an immense burden on the County Council, but there is an obvious risk that any one complaint may get lost in the overall mass that is lodged. It also seems to be the case that



the report of an individual is likely to receive more attention than that of an organisation such as a Parish Council.

Consequently, your Parish Council recommends most strongly that all of us, as individuals, become involved by reporting any holes in the immediate vicinity of where we live. Obviously, if many of us were to do so, the whole area could be covered. It would appear to be fact that the greater the number of complaints, the more likely is the repair to be carried out!

- 2. The full, approved minutes of Dilwyn Parish Council meetings, as prepared by the Parish Clerk, are published regularly on the Village Notice Boards and the Parish Council Website. What follows here summarises matters of particular interest and any decisions taken at a specific meeting.

The Regular Meeting of Dilwyn Parish Council held in the St. Mary's CE Primary School, Dilwyn on Tuesday, 6th March, 2018

At this meeting, 10 Councillors were present, with apologies from Cllrs. E. Stilwell and D. Brown. The Parish Clerk, Mr. Gwilym Rippon, and the Ward Councillor, Mr. Mark Cooper, were in attendance together with two members of the public.

a. Public Participation:

To receive the Police report.

There was no police officer present.

To receive the Ward Councillor's report.

The Ward Councillor gave a verbal report. A copy of this report has been placed on the Parish Council Website.

One member of the public asked for details of the budget for 2018-2019. He was told that these may be found on the Parish Council website.

Another member of the public asked what was the current position of the redundant building. It was explained that several enquiries had been explored. It was now envisaged that future enquiries would be on-going to see if there any grants available.

b. To approve the General Parish Council meeting on 6th February, 2018 RESOLVED: The minutes of the Council meeting on Tuesday, 6th February 2018 were approved as amended.

c. Information arising from the minutes.

The Clerk was requested to purchase 2 extra grit bins.

d. Correspondence received:

There was nothing to report under this heading.

e. Finance:

To note the bank balances for February 2018.

The Clerk reported the following

The bank balances as circulated were noted.

To discuss and approve invoices for payment.

The Clerk was instructed to pay all invoices.

f. Sewage works

It was reported that there was raw sewage spewing out into a field not far from the sewage works. The Clerk was requested to contact Environmental Health and report it.

g. Dog-Bin

A dog-bin was badly needed near Hafod Wen at the Western side of the by-pass. RESOLVED: It was agreed that this would be purchased.

h. Highway matters:

Sandpit & HR4 8JW ditches Drains near the pumping station causing flooding Potholes HR4 8JN and HR4 8JW Border oak safety fencing very close to the road.

i. Planning matters

There was nothing to report under this heading.

j. Update on the Neighbourhood plan

The group met twice in February; discussed were the site criteria. Bill Bloxsome will visit all sites and evaluate them. He will then produce a report to be discussed at the next meeting. Potential 'green spaces' were being evaluated to establish if they could be so designated.

k. The Crown Inn

Cllr. Thomas gave a full financial update in relation to the Crown Inn.

It was requested that the accounts be placed on the Parish Council Website; it was confirmed that this is being done monthly.

The Clerk reported that he had been in touch with Paul Kenyon who stated that he was no longer interested in taking on the redundant building.

One suggestion was to advertise the building as possible office space on the condition that a refundable deposit was obtained, to ensure that the building is not left in a bad state of repair.

RESOLVED: That the possible rental of the building be explored.

PLEASE NOTE:

The next meetings of the Parish Council will be on Tuesday, 1st May, 2018, commencing at 7.00pm in the Cedar Hall; these will be the Annual and the Public Meetings. It is to be hoped that there will be a good community attendance.

The Kyre Group of the Riding for the Disabled Association are based at Grafton Farm Riding Centre in Bockleton near Tenbury Wells.



Nature Notes

At least some of the frog spawn survived the frost and snow as we have seen tadpoles on the move, even though temperatures are still in single figures! Still, better to come so the forecasters say - perhaps by the time you are reading this, shorts and t-shirts will be in use (and not just by the posties!). Leaves are slowly appearing on trees and bushes but insects are so far rather scarce in the chilly

conditions. With swallows and house martins expected in April, food will be hard to come by. Certainly our garden birds still rely on our offerings, and the pair of reed buntings we saw first in March, are still with us.

The grass had grown sufficiently for me to risk a cut on one of the few fine days in early April. Two lawns done but the third one is still too wet and will be left to await dry, sunny weather. Other plants have been slow to come into growth, including early potatoes, which must be finding the soil temperature a little too low. Even the broad beans, those hardy souls, have found the growing tough. Still, a few weeks of temperatures in the 20s and all this will be forgotten about. Dust off the fan and save water before that hosepipe ban is announced!

As I finish, weather forecasters are predicting a warm spell, so perhaps spring will be bypassed this year and we can go straight to summer! Just to continue the influx of unusual birds to the area this year, a pair of white egrets was reported to me first by Philip then Richard (neighbours down The Common). Sure enough, we saw them on the partially flooded meadow land behind our house on a couple of occasions in mid April.

Dilwyn Weather for March 2018

It has turned out to be a chilly, wet spring with many plants and animals being held back in their efforts to grow and reproduce. March has helped make up the low levels of ground water by producing over 5 inches of rain (130mm), bringing the running total for 2018 to nine and a half inches (238mm). March daytime temperatures have been around 12-13 degrees in the past few years but were only 10 degrees this year. Night times have only averaged 1 degree, with 15 nights seeing freezing temperatures. In case you had forgotten, one weekend in mid month produced around a foot of snow (300mm) and March had arrived with a couple of days of heavy snow. Only 7 days were 'mostly sunny' and about the same number saw no sunshine at all. Could be a late spring!

From Valentines to Mothers Day

When my man bought his 1965 mk2 midget in 1967 when it was just 18 months old, little did he know that over 50 years later, not only would he still have his beloved car, but at the age of 75 (going on 76!) he would be grovelling on his back taking the engine and gear box out (again!!) Although the gearbox is the original the engine most definitely isn't.

The car in those days was his only vehicle and used to do lots of miles being driven from London to Warsash, near Southampton a couple of times a week, where he was Training Officer at the school of Navigation. In those day I well remember being the passenger curled up on the rear parcel shelf, while my best friend, who was courting a good friend of ours, also working at the college sat in the passenger seat. Half way through the



journey we would change places, I would stretch out in the passenger seat and Joannie folded herself onto the parcel shelf. We were somewhat more supple in those days!! Anyway I digress: at that time the car was obviously a bit poorly because there was more oil being poured into the engine than petrol into the tank.

While having a beer with a colleague, discussing the demise of the midget, he was looking through The Exchange and Mart, to see if he could source another engine. In the pub on that day, just happened to be, the owner of a local main dealers. "What are you looking for?" he asked. "Oh my car is spewing oil and I need another engine." Well I can sell you a Gold Seal engine for £52. The deal was done and I went off on a holiday to Switzerland with My mother and son and left him to it!! Wise move I think. That engine lasted several thousand miles and was eventually replaced, but not scrapped.

Always on the lookout on web sites like Ebay, for bits and pieces for the car he noticed an advert a few years ago, for a 1098 series 2 engine and gear box. The listing said that it had come out of a car that had disintegrated with rust, but there was nothing wrong with either the engine or gearbox. So he bought it and we travelled from Hereford to Anglesey to collect it. At this point I have to say that there was nothing wrong with our gearbox, but hey, why not!! Engine number 3 was duly fitted and engine number 2 sat on the garage floor gathering dust.

After that we celebrated the fact that the car was 50 years old by organizing a weekend to Llangollen with the Hereford MGOC. We had a super weekend at the Wild Pheasant Hotel and dressed the old girl up with ribbons and banners to show her age. At dinner 26 of us practically took over the restaurant and raised a glass and sang Happy Birthday to a car!! Are we mad? Or just MG owners??

Having picked up a new crankshaft for a song, (another Ebay steal) engine number 2 was dusted off, re-bored, new pistons fitted and brought back on stand by.

Over the past few weeks she's been showing signs of a problem in the clutch or gearbox. Despite the fact that, once in gear, the car was tripping along like a little gazelle there was nothing for it. The engine, gearbox and clutch had to be changed!! And what day did my beloved husband of almost 50 years choose to begin this mammoth task, why St

Valentines Day of course!! Who said 'romance is dead?'

So it was that on Sunday 11th Feb we travelled to Stoneliegh for the Triumph and MG Spares Show, with a list of parts to look out for. Although he thought the problem might lie in the driven plate he bought a complete clutch, new old stock for £63 and some other bits and bobs. We did actually make a nice time of it because our son had bought us a 'Red Letter Day' for Christmas and on looking for something to spend it on, Mike happened to see that one of the hotels was just 4 miles from the Stoneleigh site, how fortuitous!! So I was rewarded for my patience with a nice overnight stay in a lovely hotel, a session in the sauna and a delicious dinner.



So come Tuesday the 14th all was made ready. 1st remove the bonnet, which is much heavier that I remembered from the last time I helped, or could it be that at 68 I'm not as strong as I used to be?

Next I was asked for some rags, this was going to be a mucky job! So I duly sorted out an old towel and some tea towels that had seen better days. I left them in the hall to be picked up when he passed. A short time later I heard him say, 'thanks for that, these look good rags'. Alarm bell began to ring. "Good rags? No just an old towel". I suddenly had 'a moment' remembering that I had left an almost brand new heavy cotton fitted sheet in the room where he was watching 'you tube' instructions on how to do something or other to do with the car!! No wonder he though it was good rag. Thankfully I got to it before the scissors and we were able to have a laugh when I showed his the real rag, an old towel with a hole in!!

By the 17th of February the engine had been removed and all was well, apart from a small paint chip on the off side wing!! The car was pushed outside to give more room in the garage. It was a lovely sunny Saturday and we decided to go into town. We pushed the car back in, and Mike put a large block of wood behind the wheel to stop it rolling. He then looked round for a 2nd block of wood to put the other side of the wheel, "why are you doing that?" I asked, "It would need an earth quake to shift that!" Undeterred by my mocking he placed another wooden block by the wheel. Imagine how we laughed when we heard on the radio that there had been an earthquake in Swansea while we were out!! It was the biggest earthquake in the UK for over 10 years and the biggest in the area since 1906, measuring 4.4 magnitude. Good job he chocked the wheel!!!

The job progressed over the next couple of weeks, with me keeping him supplied with tea and coffee and warm soup at lunchtime. Occasionally I might be called on to help

with some bolts that I could reach with smaller hands. Or help with guiding a big lump of car on the end of a rope.



Then 'The Beast from the East,' struck and temperatures plummeted. The snow came and carried on coming. Undeterred we plodded on, him in this "Huggy Bear Suit" me in fur lined willies and a Goose down hat to beat the cold. I felt a bit like Nannock of the North, but at least I was warm in an unheated garage!! At 75yrs old the work progressed at a leisurely pace. 3-4 hours a day was all the body could cope with, but there was no rush, it just had to be done properly, no point in killing yourself!! Refitting the gearbox had its' moments, but we managed it eventually.

Then came the tricky bit, lowering the engine back in. Easier said than done and there were times when I thought it just wasn't going to fit!! However patience is a virtue and eventually it plonked into position the nuts and bolts were tightened up and it was looking good. Sunday 11th of March was Mothers Day. Our son and daughter arrived at about 11.30am and thought we might go out for lunch. But the car was not yet "broom brooming", so our daughter took me out for afternoon tea and cakes into Leominster, while our son helped with the final details, like fitting the hoses, and checking there were no leaks anywhere. By the time we got home the car was nearer to being started, but still not quite there. At about 5pm our other daughter, son-in-law and grandchildren arrived. I had a cup of tea with them and at about 5.30 I was called out to the garage. Pup, pup, pup, BROOOOM BROOOOM!! The little car was purring again, bless her and bless Mike as well. Break out the champagne. It took from Valentines Day to Mothers Day, but it was worth it and hopefully she will enjoy her trip out next Sunday for the HMGOC wake up run!!!


