Geoffrey's Column

Immortality

On my first visit to Greece in the summer of '88, there was a bit of an accident in an estate agent's office. The agent, a very laid-back Welshman, asked me how long I had been on the island. Dilwyn Weather for March 2019



Two and three quarter inches (70mm) of rain fell, bringing the total for the first three months of the year to 6 inches (150mm) – well down on what we would usually expect. It was also warmer than normal during daylight hours, at an average of 14 degrees (highest 20), but nights remained cooler, with 3.5 degrees the

average for March (coldest −2).

Several bouts of stormy weather assailed us, including one named storm (Gareth) on the 13th and gales on the 9th and the 10th, with near gales on the 15th. The month split into two, weather-wise – the first 17 days had rain every day, the last 14 days were dry with plenty of sunshine. That seems a long time ago now – as I write on 4th April, there is about an inch of snow outside and, at nearly midday, the thermometer outside reads just one degree. Springtime in England is rarely predictable!



Beira



The port of Beira has been in the news after being hit by a cyclone that destroyed the country's hinterland. Beira was also in the news from 1966 to 1975 when Harold Wilson ordered the Royal Navy and the Royal Air Force to blockade the port and prevent Southern Rhodesia receiving oil and other designated cargoes.

Beira was the port for Salisbury and the tanker port for Umtali and the whole conflict had occurred during the "Wind of Change" that was affecting Africa. Nyasaland and Northern Rhodesia had reverted to Black African control

and Southern Rhodesia was next in line. Their white Prime Minister Ian Smith declared UDI and broke away from colonial rule. The 200,000 whites hoped to hang on to their way of life with the knowledge that South Africa and Portuguese East Africa were sympathetic to their cause.

In 1968 I was on a Clan boat and we neared the port of Beira. A Royal Navy frigate approached us and steamed alongside. We had a lot of deck cargo at that time, some enormous structures that were emblazoned with the words "For Rhodesia" painted in red on a white background. Hardly camouflaged. Expecting the frigate to tell us to expect a boarding party, we were surprised to hear the officer ask us if we could take their mail to Mombasa, our next port. The mail sack was duly transferred and the frigate turned away after thanking us.

Alongside at Beira, we discharged the Rhodesian cargo and commenced loading various commodities. We had tobacco to load and I was looking at the white wooden cases marked "Produce of Swaziland". I had never heard of Swaziland tobacco, and they were being discharged from railway trucks that had signs "Return to Salisbury".

After loading the tobacco, we had a visit from the British Consul and he wanted to know how many tons we had loaded and for whom -300 tons for this British company, 400 tons for that one, etc., etc. After all, the British worker wanted his smoke and didn't want to pay extra for an inferior product.

The UN who had ordered the blockade and the British who ran the show didn't have a successful operation. Oil still flowed into Rhodesia, mainly from South Africa and tankers that ran the blockade. But with newly-formed African nations wanting Britain to invade and attack the white Rhodesians, and the probable repercussions of South Africa and Portuguese whites joining in the fray, the Beira Patrol served its purpose in keeping everything quiet.

In 1975, after a bloody battle to hang on, the Portuguese left Mozambique and the Beira Patrol was wound up. The British left Rhodesia in 1980 and Robert Mugabe came to power.

Nature Notes

Just think how adaptable our animals and plants have to be! February this year saw day after day of warm, sunny weather. An assortment of insects appeared, plants came into bud and birds were nest building in earnest. Just a month later, those insects, tender shoots and newly hatched baby birds were greeted by several hours of heavy snow and temperatures struggling just above zero. Next came several days of heavy rain, which is certainly good for the plants but possibly not for the newly hatched birds and insects. We humans, of course, just complain, then turn up the heating or pull on an extra jumper as our way of adapting. I actually saw two swallows on a wire above our garden on the morning of Sunday 31st March. I wonder where the poor things went?

Results have come in from the RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch, which took place in January. Top of the list was the house sparrow, followed by the starling, blue tit, blackbird, wood pigeon, goldfinch, great tit, robin, chaffinch and magpie. The two large birds in this top ten are certainly well known around Dilwyn, as we seem to be plagued by pigeons and are seeing an increasing number of magpies – both birds being expert scavengers.



Herefordshire Wildlife Trust Weobley & District Branch

On 4th April, the Weobley Branch of HWT received a thought-provoking talk *Moccas Park: Ecology and Management of a National Nature Reserve* from Bob Silverwood of Natural England. Moccas Park, on the west side of the river Wye south of Bredwardine, is famed for its veteran and ancient trees.

As 'wood pasture' since at least the 14th century, a fallow deer park since the 1600s, an early 19th century 'regency parkland' with landscaping by Capability Brown and Humphrey Repton and a site of international importance for its trees, Natural England has Moccas as one of its Parkland Reserves.

A fine example of an ancient tree is 'The Old Man of Moccas', about 800–900 years old, from which acorns are now being collected to grow into young trees. The parkland is also home to the Moccas Beetle, first recorded in 1934, unknown outside Moccas Park in the UK and, in Europe, found only in Sweden and Germany. Thirteen of the UK's 18 bat species are present and a wide range of bird species, including a significant population of Pied Flycatcher – this of some relevance to HWT members, whose annual journal is *The Flycatcher*.

With many precious oaks, there is concern now about 'acute oak decline', and much work is being done to understand and overcome the causes of this. Moccas Hill Wood, to the west of the parkland, has recently been leased to The Woodland Trust, whose aim is to establish it as an open 'wooded' landscape with broadleaf species and a 'bluebell lawn'.

As a follow up to this talk, the Weobley Branch of HWT is hoping to organise a walk through Moccas on Saturday 1st June. Further details will be made available at the next Branch event on **Thursday 2nd May** – this a talk on **The Welsh Beaver Project**.

Weobley and District Local History Society

The meeting on 27th March included the AGM. Brian Holley, our chairman for the past 10 years, and Pat Millington, Wally Fletcher and Liz Holley stood down from the committee. Brian offered to continue as a committee member. Thanks to them all in helping to run a successful Society. Graham Saunders was elected as the new chairman, with Maggie Waldman as secretary, Chris Jennings as Treasurer, Sue Hubbard continues as Curator of the museum, ably assisted by Gina Holley. Jan Gay continues on the committee and Lorna Warwicker is joining the committee.

The meeting continued with a fascinating film of aged farmers talking about their experiences in the 1920s and 30s. Pembridge was described as run down, with no tarmac on the roads and very dusty. So much so, that people had to beat the dust out of their clothes after walking down the street. One farmer put salt on fields to encourage mushrooms to grow, which he then sold. Roger Williams, born in 1930, described milking their 10 cows by hand and picking up potatoes for 9 old pence a day (less than 4p in today's money!). His dad worked the horses ploughing and harvesting wheat. Cider was given out to the workers in the fields. The girls only had one posh dress and the river Wye froze over in 1939. Laurie Whitall described cutting around a field of corn by hand, then cutting the rest using horses. The corn was collected into stools, 18 feet high. Steam engines were also used, but they had to be fired up at 05.00 to be in steam ready to start work at 08.00. A van came round

by the butcher, baker, grocer and pharmacist once per week. Every cottage had a pig. I liked his thoughts on life "If you want to get anything out, you got to put something in". It still applies today. A memorable and enjoyable evening.

The museum held a very successful open day on 6th April when visitors were able to look through documents and pictures that are usually in store but, thanks to the loan of the library, could be displayed on this occasion. There were 37 visitors, most of them local but also a family from Hungary, and everyone found something of interest. Some wanted to delve into family history or find pictures of their house as it used to be, while others just enjoyed a browse through the collection. Given the numbers and positive comments, we have decided to open one Saturday a month over the summer. Details will be posted on the list of events.

Our summer excursion is on Wednesday June 12th. Members make their own way to Hereford and we meet at 11am at the Cathedral Chained library to view a selection of their historical documents. Members make their own lunch arrangements, then reconvene at the Coningsby Hospital at 3.15pm for a guided tour. There is a £6 charge.


